## THE ANCIENT MONUMENTS AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL AREAS ACT 1979 ENTRY IN THE SCHEDULE OF MONUMENTS

The monument known as Monimail, Cardinal Beaton's Tower consists of the remaining portions of a country residence of the bishop/archbishops of St Andrews. The main element is a four-storeyed chamber tower traditionally associated with Cardinal David Beaton, archbishop from 1539 to 1546. The area to be scheduled is a rectangle measuring 60m along its longer axis and 40m transversely. The top 30 centimetres of ground within the area is excluded from the scheduling to allow for continued cultivation and maintenance. The monument, which lies in the Parish of Monimail and the County of Fife as shown outlined in red on the Plan annexed and executed as relative hereto

is hereby included in the Schedule of Monuments appearing to the Scottish Ministers to be of national importance compiled and maintained by them under section 1(1) of the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979.
